Writing the narrative for your heritage pages

If you're like most of us, the idea of writing a history can seem pretty daunting, but writing for a family heritage album doesn't need to be. First of all, you don't need to write a book or even a short story. You can write in "snippets".



Learning the family story is an important part of growing up.

The first step is to plan the album – what story do you want this particular album to tell? (See the May/June issue of this newsletter.)

Once you have the plan, gather the information you want to tell for each part of the plan.

If you have old pictures that you don't know a lot about, ask other family members to add to what you do know.

Send a copy of the picture(s) to people who are not in your area and ask them to tell you what they know about the people, places, or events. If you can, sit down in person with those who live nearby. If you use a small tape recorder, you don't need to take notes as you talk to someone but can make your notes afterward to get the info in writing. Then save the tapes for future reference.

Now you've gathered the information you want to convey. If it helps to put it in outline form, do that. If it helps to just make general notes for each page or set of pages, do that. There are about as many ways to start on the writing as there are people wanting to write a family history. The best one is the one that works for you.

At this point, you need to decide if you want to do the writing yourself or hire someone to do it for you.

If you want to do it yourself, sit down and write what you want people to know about

each picture or group of pictures or items. If it makes it easier, write a letter to a specific person to tell them about it. This works well if you think about one of the younger family members. The classic things to write about are the 5 W's – who, what, where, when, and why. Of course, you can expand on each of those if you want to but, if you get at least that much written down, you'll be doing great.

If you don't want to do the actual writing yourself, call me and we can get it done together.

Getting this information into written form can become fun and it is certainly a great gift to the rest of your family.
